Many of the resources require an NHS OpenAthens Password particularly if used off site. Registration is simple and takes only a few minutes – sign up below

# LibKey Nomad

LibKey Web Integrates with the NHS Knowledge and Library Hub to provide improved A-Z journal listings, journal cover images as well as enhanced direct linking to PDFs and DOI look-up functionality.

LibKey Nomad is a browser extension that channels users to the licenced content they are eligible for when they are searching other platforms.



A browser extension, which enables links to full-text articles when users are searching open web content, e.g. publishers websites or Wikipedia.

The LibKey browser plugin combines information about your e-journal holdings, authentication and article linking to deliver one-click access to PDF and HTML articles. Individuals will be able to install Nomad on their own devices and instructions will be published for this.

Guidance will also be provided to help local IT teams deploy the extension across your network.

The extension is available for Chrome, Firefox and Microsoft Edge browsers.



# New Library Team member Dr Gavin Moore

Dr Gavin Moore, Library and Knowledge Services Manager, GEH & SWFT.

It is always hard to write about yourself, but hopefully the following will describe me in under a minute's read!

I started in my new role this February, moving from UHCW. I have worked in the NHS in a few different roles over the years including as a library assistant, clinical librarian (CEBIS Specialist) and now as a library manager. I have enjoyed the unique challenges of each role and the ethos within the NHS, which is all about providing the best patient care. It is this ethos specifically which has drawn me back to the NHS. I feel within the NHS library services are also particularly valued, as they support the evidence based decisions that are vitally important to patient care.



In another life I have also worked in two higher education (HE) libraries as a library assistant and assistant librarian. In the latter role I supported a medical faculty, as well as supporting research more generally. I have found there is a lot of similar work and learning, which can take place between these two sectors, and hope to bring my experiences of both to my new role.

For instance, currently I am leading in the development of a regional repository for eight Trusts. This builds on my knowledge from HE of supporting an institutional repository. I am enthusiastic that that the Trusts involved in the project, and specifically us here at GEH and SWFT, can utilise the opportunity it presents to forward the research agenda and advance the case for the support library services can provide researchers. .

I am very keen on advancing research generally, as I believe it is a key factor to progress and also to ensure we provide our patients with improved services.

The repository will also help with knowledge mobilisation across our institutions. I also have some academic research and teaching experience. I have completed a PhD in History, and specifically medieval history. I have also been involved in my previous role as a clinical librarian in supporting systematic reviews, one of which has now been published and highlighted as a paper of note by a leading body in the area. I have also taught extensively in HE and worked as a visiting lecturer for a history department.



I enjoyed teaching a great deal, so I am also very enthusiastic about supporting our education programmes and students.

In my spare time I eclectically collect hobbies. Hailing from Cumbria I do enjoy hikes and climbing, and as a librarian I enjoy reading various fiction and non-fiction books. I have also developed an interest in languages and music, and I have always had a love of making things, whether drawing, sculpting, or crafting.
