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Beyond the Average: Making Fairer Decisions for Public Health



Despite efforts to reduce health inequalities, people in the most affluent neighbourhoods in England can expect to live almost 12 healthy years longer than those in the most deprived. Research demonstrates substantial public support for reducing these gaps, but none of the standard economic tools used to inform spending decisions can quantify the impact of these decisions on health inequalities.

EQUIPOL researchers have developed a range of 'smart decision tools' to help decision-makers reduce this gap. These analytical tools expand measurement beyond averages and utilise the availability of large and complex datasets. These methods can identify which elements of

a population are most disadvantaged and can illustrate the trade-offs between cost-effectiveness and equity in the distribution of health benefits.

In this short <u>report</u>, the authors seek to outline the potential of these tools within health and wider public services to inform provision of screening, vaccination, new medicines and investments in facilities, and argue that the existing methods utilised by agencies such as NICE are inadequate.

It concludes with three recommendations: **1.** All government agencies should ensure that national expenditure decisions are informed by analysis of their predicted impact on social inequality in health and wellbeing. **2.** HM Treasury, National and Local Government should accelerate the use of tools for modelling long-term impacts – especially in the context of childhood policy. **3.** UK Research and Innovation and the National Institute for Health Research should review UK research capacity for quantitative analysis of policy impact, with a view to strengthening research training, data collection, analysis and reporting.

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
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
