




Tell It To The Bees (Dying Matters) is Performance Storytelling and Live Original Music brought to you by Warwickshire Public Libraries.


Matthew O'Reilly is an EMT in New York, his TedTalk video 'Am I dying?' The honest answer discusses his experiences of being with people when they die.
